President's Message

The Tin Goose is Coming to Town

Wandering down the road, in the America of the 1920s, you might have seen a number of "Tin Lizzies", or Model T Fords, chuffing along the highway. And looking up in the sky, you might have also seen a "Tin Goose" grinding along overhead. Certainly a bygone era. However that era is going to make a brief visit to Auburn in April. The Experimental Aircraft Association's Ford 4-AT-E Tri-motor will be here giving rides from Friday the 26th until Sunday the 28th.

This airplane is truly a flying piece of aviation history. The first of these three-engine transports came off the assembly line in 1926, and they were a mainstay of the U.S. commercial aviation industry until they were ultimately replaced by the DC-2 and -3 some years later. Today there are only 18 Ford Tri-motors left, and less than half of those are currently flyable. At a time when we take it for granted that we can fly in shirt-sleeve comfort, and have a glass of wine with our hot dinner as we cruise along at Mach .85 above the weather, the Tri-motor is an anachronism. Unpressurized, noisy and bumping along at about 100 mph in your wicker basket seat, it was a different world. Or, to look at it another way, the airplane has approximately the same performance as a Cessna 150. So, imagine a coast-to-coast flight in a two-place Cessna, and that's about how long a trans-continental trip in a Ford Tri-motor would have taken back in the day. Amazingly, as ubiquitous as this icon of American aviation history was, there were actually only 199 of these Fords ever built.

The EAA owns and operates NC8407, a Tri-Motor that was originally flown by Eastern Air Transport--a forerunner of Eastern Airlines. Seats will not be reserved, but will be available on a first come, first served basis

for the day of purchase. Only 180 seats will be available over the three days of their operation here in Auburn. Purchase tickets online here.

If you are interested in a springtime aviation adventure right here in Auburn, maybe this is the opportunity you are looking for. It is an exciting event for our airport!

Aviation Careers and Interview

AAA conducted the Aviation Careers and Interview Training Event in the Barnstormer Room at 18:00 on 03/11/19. Facilitators **Larry Borchert**, **Don Wolfe** and **Renata Mackenroth** presented to over 25 young adults. In addition, there were several parents and 11 Aviation mentors in attendance. Pizza and refreshments were served.

Renata Mackenroth, (2018 AAA Scholarship recipient) and **Helen Dobeck** did an outstanding job of promoting the course and getting aviation-minded people to attend. Renata also did a great job during her first performance as one of our facilitators!

At the conclusion of the presentation Don Wolfe assembled "The Mentors" in the front of the room in order of age. Each mentor was introduced and their "expertise" was noted. Don pointed out that ALL of the mentors share a "common love for aviation" and the only difference between one end of the line and the other was experience.

The AAA Mentors in attendance were: Wayne Mooneyham, Mike Duncan, Larry Borchert, Doug Fee, Don Wolfe, Dan Foster, Randy Leys, Casey Long, Brice Corcoran, James Jacobson, and Renata Mackenroth. 


Bronze monument of Col. Bud Anderson and his P-51 Mustang "Old Crow" created by Douglas Van Howd and installed at the Auburn Airport
