Vice President's Message

As has been previously reported to you in this space, as well as at our monthly meetings, your Board of Directors has been researching and debating the possibility of establishing a permanent endowment. The purpose of this endowment would be to provide a ongoing source of funding for our scholarships. This has been a nearly six-month discussion that has involved multiple briefings with the Placer Community Foundation, followed by extensive question and answer sessions. Untold numbers of emails have zipped back and forth between various members of our Association, members of the Board, and the PCF representative. Your Board also met with a financial advisor to discuss the issue, and to get his perspective and thoughts on just whether or not this would be a good move for the AAA. I believe that your Board has truly performed it's duty of due diligence.

The end result is that, on June 3, your Board met and unanimously voted in favor of establishing an endowment to be held within the umbrella of the the Placer Community Foundation. Personally, I'm very excited about this move. While we may have a few years of work ahead of us to bump up the funding to a level that we want, I believe that, in years to come, we will look back on this move and be very glad that we did it. The beauty of whole idea is that the endowment will be a permanent thing that will fund our scholarships *in perpetuity.* Long after you and I are long gone, our endowment will still be providing aviation career help to our youth here in Auburn. That is a legacy that, I believe, we can all take great pride in.

Meanwhile, where things stand right now, we've put about half as much into the endowment as we'd like to have. Our very energetic and creative Scholarship Director, **Don Wolfe**, has been brainstorming ways to finish it's funding, and you'll be hearing more about his efforts in months to come. Of course, we're open to your ideas, input and suggestions. More to come on this issue

On Tues. June 4th, a wonderful thing happened here at our little airport. 3 baby foxes rescued from a box on the side of the road in St. Helena, Ca. found their way to a local rescue organization in Auburn; Gold Country Wildlife Rescue; goldcountrywildliferescue.org & were flown to a Sanctuary in Scottsdale, Az. to live out their days safe & protected. It all started with Mike Duncan forwarding me an email floating around regarding a request to fly 3 foxes from Auburn to Arizona. Knowing I or anyone I knew wouldn't be able to accommodate. I decided to save the email because you never know who you're going to come across in aviation. **Brian Warner** is flying with us building hrs. He walked into the office for a flight on a day I was working. I realized I had nothing to lose & asked if he would want to fly some baby foxes to Arizona. Imagine how thrilled I was when he said "yes!" I immediately pulled up the email & called the contact who told me he was still looking for a pilot. After that, it all fell into place. I decided to come in early on the flight day to see the pups off. As I pulled up to park, I saw 3 people & a very large crate heading to the plane. I ran over, introduced myself & took a quick peek at the little

cuties. One little guy looked at me for a quick second, then, retreated to the back of the crate.

Sallysue Stein from Gold Country Wildlife & I briefly chatted with Brian & his co-pilot **Thomas Chatterton**. We took a few pictures, loaded them up & off they went.

Sallysue & I walked out to the edge of the grass to watch them take off. In talking to her, we discovered I have a friend that knows her daughter, **Chelsea**. Chelsea is an aerobatic pilot. Chelsea & I have mementos from a WWII B-17 pilot whose son is our friend. It's just another example of how small aviation really is. After they were long gone, we turned around to head back. Brian kept in touch to let us know they & the pups arrived safely in Arizona.

I felt honored to have been able to be a part of helping these innocent babies get to where they needed to go. Once again aviation comes to the rescue.


