Maybe it's because I'm a person of a certain age, I've flown a "few" different airplanes, and I count my yeas of experience in decades, people seem to think I may know a thing or two about aviation. I get asked the question from time to time, "What's the safest airplane to buy?" Well I'm going to tell you my

answer at the end of this letter on page 2 or3 depending how long winded I get. And oh, about that "There's a Fly In my Soup" thing, it's a parody I wrote about back in the September PropWash. If you haven't read it, you can find it by googling "Auburn Aviation Association" then click on Newsletters and choose September 2020. Or just try this **LINK** -

<u>Enough</u> rambling already, Eh? Here goes. It's time to put another notch in my "flying" belt so to speak. Type rating #8 BAE-125 or

better known as a Hawker 1000 has a service ceiling of 43,000 feet, cruises at 450 Knots (520 MPH), flies nonstop to the east coast or Hawaii on a "bag" of gas. It can stay airborne more than seven hours. But easy on drinking too much coffee; that lavatory can only hold so much.

I remember my first full motion simulator flight safety training experience for a Turbo PropPA 28-31T (Cheyenne II), like it was yesterday. It was in Florida. I was





awestruck as I walked up to this huge building. I was greeted by the CSR with a welcome packet and my very own badge. It was like I was the most important person in the world. There were hallways and hallways of classrooms. Simulator bays full of different aircraft types. The cockpit of the simulator, the seats, the controls, and instruments were just like the real airplane. The graphics were so cool, just like the Pac-Man game we played back home at the FBO. I thought to myself, I've arrived, I really have arrived! It can't get any better than this! That was over 3 decades ago.

Since then I've lost track of how many simulator training events that I have had. I have so much respect for the professionals that dedicate themselves to **TRAINING** safe pilots using **SOP's** (standard operating procedures) and flight profiles. Team work is emphasized through **CRM** (crew resource management). Uniform training allows us all to \int sing \int from the same song sheet, so to speak. Once you step up to the turbo prop and jet world, the insurance companies look for annual training. Just like at the airlines, I prefer every 6 to 9 months in simulators.




As I put virtual "pen to paper," for this newsletter, the ink is barely dry on my new temporary certificate BAE-125 type rating (aka Hawker 1000). The simulator graphics are so realistic now. Looking out the window, I see clouds, mountains, airplanes, buildings, and fuel

trucks that pull onto the runway as you're about to land. JGo Around, Max Power, Flaps 15, Positive Rate, Gear Up, Missed Approach Altitude set, Nav Source, FLC, Auto Pilot ON, Navigate, Missed Approach Check List. J Even when you're taxiing out and you see the cracks in the concrete or pavement, you can feel the bumps as you taxi along. While airborne you can



experience things like traffic, terrain and wind shear warnings. Proper procedures are taught so we can recognize and avoid the conflict. It's always humbling to be reminded of the responsibility we have in being well prepared for the unexpected.

I remember when I first started flying all this seemed so far off in the future. Then opportunities





came along and before I knew it, things really took off. So if you really, really, want this crazy aviation life, keep on keeping on. The dream that got you started will become a reality!!

And now for the big reveal of my favorite aircraft, whether it has 1 engine or 4, propellers or jets, the best one to have, is the one with a well trained pilot(s).

It's time for me to sign off and enjoy my bowl of hot soup. I look forward to seeing you all at our monthly AAA Zoom meeting on Wednesday, March 3rd 6:00 pm California time. In addition to our scheduled talk on the Wright brothers, Kelsey, Kelly and I have a demo on how to remove frost and ice on an airplane. One is really smart, one really easy, and one really expensive.

That's my story, and I'm sticking to it. Eh!

these applicants.









February 28. If you know of anyone interested in getting a scholarship, time is running out to apply.


Look out city! Here they come again; those dang volunteers making the

Boeing 777-300 ERSF

Some of you may remember Captain Bill Sleeper from the Ford Trimotor tour in Auburn, California. Bill recently participated as a First Officer on the flight test of the new Boeing 777-300 ERSF Freighter at the KMOD Modesto airport. The flights were made primarily to collect noise data on the 777.



A Cessna 182 support aircraft was used to take atmospheric samples prior to the 777 conducting low altitude flights over the airport to record acoustic data. The pilots in the 182 take air samples to determine the acoustical properties of the atmosphere over the microphone site beginning at 2400' Agl down to 50' Agl. Humidity is the big driver with a



narrow range of acceptable conditions for consistency reasons. When the atmosphere is acceptable, the 777 is launched.

Flight test runs in the 777 begin at 2400 ft. agl over the microphones. Readings are taken every 100 ft. in the descent down to around 50' AGL. An air sampling device is hooked directly into the right wing root cabin air vent of the Big Jet and that analog data is converted to a digital format by a computer under the rear seat. The data is transmitted to the ground station which then plots the readings on a graph for analysis.

The pilots took this rare opportunity to compare the size of the B-777-300 to the Cessna 182. I think we'll all agree that the 182 will easily fit inside that gargantuan GE-90-155B engine!

Lifetime Member Shawn Bickford



This month we feature AAA Life Member Shawn Bickford. Shawn has been involved in aviation his whole life. It all began with his father who was a military pilot and airline pilot with American Airlines. Shawn's father was also active in general aviation, owning a family Cessna 180K which Shawn still has today.

Shawn graduated from San Jose State with a degree in Aeronautics-Maintenance. He also earned the following licenses and ratings in

college: Commercial, Single Engine, Multi Engine, Instrument, and CFI-I as well as his A&P & IA mechanic certificates. Later he would add the ATP, Single Engine Sea. In December 2020 he added a Commercial Glider rating while in Hawaii. Type ratings include DHC7, Airbus320, Boeing 747,757,767,787.

Shawn's first flying job was flying Cherokee 6's in Southeast Alaska out of Juneau, Haines, and Skagway while in college. This included passengers, mail, and Glacier Bay flightseeing tours. He even flew fish one summer in Bristol Bay using a Cessna 185.

After college Shawn worked for Northrop Corp. manufacture engineering on the F18, F5, 747, and B-2 prior to joining the USAF Reserves at Norton AFB in 1984. Following USAF undergraduate pilot training in the T-37 and T-38 Shawn flew the heavy 4-engine Lockheed C-141 Starlifter all over the world and in Desert Storm. He began his airline career with Hawaiian Airlines in the de Havilland Dash 7 turboprop before accepting employment with United Airlines where he is still an International Captain on the highly advanced Boeing 787 Dreamliner.

Shawn and wife Juliette are very active in their church and in community service. Shawn journeys from Auburn to Alaska almost every year in the Cessna 180 where he and Juliette accomplish missionary work and education for Alaskan youth. They also explore the Alaskan wilderness with the 180 on floats and wheels. Shawn is also part owner of a Piper Cherokee 6 and American Champion Citabria Explorer.



Juliette and Shawn have 4 children and 3 grandchildren. Daughter Tierra is a First Officer for Delta Airlines, son Lance is a commercial rated pilot, A&P, IA mechanic employed by Bearing Air in Nome Alaska. Lance and wife Rabekka have 2 children. Daughter Marena (soloed with Mach-5) and husband Nathanial have 1 daughter and one on the way. They live in Fort Worth, Texas. How Downward Facing Dog Helped My Steep Turns



Every spring, I have to go to Wichita, Kansas to fly a flight simulator at Flight Safety International. This annual recurrent training is required by the insurance company, so there is no getting out of it. Being away from home and getting wrung out by the instructors is not something I consider fun at this point in my life, but I have done this many times in many cities, so no big deal; I'm a trained professional in action.

I have been doing a little bit of yoga for 20 years now. Heather (my wife of 22 years) got her yoga teaching certification 15 years ago. This meant I had someone to answer the questions that bothered me so. One of those questions was about the pose Downward Dog. I have always struggled with strength in my shoulders and Downward Dog always filled me with tension. Instructors will say to take a break and relax while in Downward Dog pose. Well, that never happened for me. One day I asked my favorite yoga instructor for guidance. "Relax everything else, silly," she replied. It turns out that parts of your arms and shoulders have to stay strong, but most other parts of your body can relax. Eureka! It was a transformational moment for my yoga practice.

What does this have to do with Wichita, Kansas, you ask?

Back to the simulator. "Give me a 360 degree turn to the left and then right," the instructor says. I set the heading bug on North, turn the airplane to the bug and begin. Add a touch of power, 5 degrees nose up on the Attitude Indicator, roll the bank to 45 degrees and ease back on the control yoke to freeze the nose at 5 degrees and here we go. I get everything stabilized and as we are passing thru 90 degrees of turn (West), I realize that I am completely tensed up. I I think of how Michael Schumacher the Formula One racing legend would try to take a moment to relax on the straights at 180 mph. Downward Dog pops into my head. Tense only what you need to and relax everything else. My shoulders release from their position trying to touch my ears. My stomach and legs relax. As we pass thru South on the Heading Indicator, I release the tension in my jaw and have fully relaxed into my pose...ah, steep turn. I giggle to myself thinking how many of these turns I have done over the past 23 years, and as good as I thought I was, I just found a better way.

No matter how proficient and professional you think you are, you can be better. That is my challenge to you. Be 1% better every day. At something .. anything. There is always room for improvement.
