As the Prop Turns

Another month has gone by. Spring is all around us. Green fields, flowers, birds, bees and all that stuff. Not only are the plants blooming, so are the pilots. Kelly Richards earned his Commercial Certificate with Michael Poteet as his instructor. Kelly has been working in heavy equipment and is looking for a career change. Anyone looking for a new Commercial pilot? Wayne Colburn earned his Instrument rating with Mike Duncan as his instructor. Actually Mike Duncan finished him up after all of the hard work by Mike Poteet. Grant Ozdinski soloed for the first time on April 19 with Mike Duncan as instructor. Grant soloed in a C-152 at the Auburn Airport on a beautiful calm evening. John Carr soloed again after eight years. He was unable to finish before because life got in the way, but the bug struck again and now he is flying. His wife Rebecca has also gotten the bug and has started lessons. Congratulations on your new adventure in life.

While on the subject of new adventures, OK reoccurring adventures, I managed to get recurrent on my float rating. I am now legal with my gear up landings. Dylan Love came by and needed a Biennial Flight Review. Dylan has access to a Husky on amphibious float and a Cirrus to

do the BFR and needless to say I chose the Husky. For Dylan the most needed part is the ground work (like most of us). Who wants to study books and take test when all you want to do is fly?



After a quick hour or so of reviewing the rules, regs and charts, we are off into the air. Dylan gets through all the basic flight maneuvers, slow flight, stalls, emergency procedures and navigation stuff and now it is time to do the fun part, landings. Let see where is the nearest lake? Voila, Camp Far West. We take a quick trip down the Bear River and on to the lake. On the way we dodge the power lines across the river and notice that the towers on either side of the river have what appear to be eagles nests in them. In the southern most tower we actually see a bird flying out of the nest. Now back to the business at hand, getting current in the water. We fly north along the lake to look for debris in the lake and then Dylan slows, brings in the first notch of flap, and turns base. Seeing no boats or any other type of obstructions, we turn final. There is little or no wind which makes for a glassy water

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land. That means there is no good reference as to how high we are above the water except for the shore line, which we keep relatively close. Speed 75 kts, 17" of manifold pressure, full flaps, and we just let the airplane settle to the water at about 100 to 200 ft. /min. as we touch down, the power comes back, stick in your lap, and the



plane stops in the water. As the planes stops, the flaps come up to the second notch, the trim is set, the power comes up, stick forward to come up on the step. As we accelerate we lift up on one float and then the other one comes up and we are off for another landing. Dylan is pleased that he has not lost his touch and he has two more chances

to prove the first one was not luck. The next two are just as nice as the first. Now it is my turn. Dylan has landed long on the lake so I now have to water taxi to the far end and turn around. Water rudders down. I forget how sluggish the plane is on the water and how far ahead you have to think to get it where you want. Finally headed the right direction, water rudders up, flaps set, trim set, power up, and with a little help from Dylan, I am airborne. I do pretty well with my landing, and I am now legally current, but am I safe? I did have a great time with the plane on the water but now it is time to go home. Back to Auburn to get Dylan current on wheels and we are done for this year. I wonder if I can get him to do this again next year.

May 18th is coming upon us rapidly, and why is that important? That is the first of four Friday Flydays coming this year. On the third Friday of the next four months, Friday Flydays will once again be raising money for a charitable cause. The first cause will the Bud Anderson scholarship fund. A DC-3 will be here again for rides so get your reservation now. There will be free food and music and fun for the whole family, so come out and enjoy the evening. Starts at 5pm and goes to dark. See you then.


