t the November

14th meeting of the Placer County Supervisors, an issue concerning the airport is tentatively on the agenda. The supervisors will vote on zoning additional buildings near the airport as an overfly zone, expanding the number of buildings considered to be impacted by the airport. This step is necessary before the approved extension of the runway can happen.

At the most recent meeting of the Placer County Airport Land Use Commission, whose members had to vote to send the issue up to the Supervisors, airport opponents were numerous, impassioned, and vocal. While there were many supporters of the airport in the audience, Dennis Pearson was the only person to identify himself and speak in support of the airport. If you support the airport, I encourage you to do two things:

- Write an email in support of the airport to BoardClerk@placer.ca.gov or mail the same through the U.S. Postal Service to the County, Attn: Clerk of the Board, 175 Fulweiler Avenue, Auburn, CA 95603
- 2. Attend the November 14th meeting at 10 am in the Domes at 175 Fulweiler in Auburn and say your piece in support of the airport. When you walk in the room, sign up at the beginning of the meeting to speak, even if you get up and say only, "I support the airport." Speakers have up to three minutes.

If you need a topic or have one to add to our existing list of three minute subjects, email me at president@auburnaviationassociation.org. You can also attend over Zoom. There have been some Zoom shenanigans recently, so be sure to identify yourself clearly as a sane citizen when you get on the call. Here are our existing topics for which we have speakers.

- Safety is our first concern

- Scholarship program success

- KAUN as economic driver
- EAA Programs hands-on STEM education



An Update from the Manager's Desk at KAUN

2025 Biennial National Plan of Integrated Airport Systems (NPIAS)

On December 1, 2023 the NPIAS data will be pulled from Baseedaircraft.com for the 2025 report. What does this mean for us and how does it affect the field?



Accurate based aircraft information
helps the FAA in planning and forecasting
the growth in the general aviation
community, especially as the FAA looks at
airport and other system-wide improvements. Based aircraft
counts are one of the criteria used in determining an airport's
role in the FAA's biennial National Plan of Integrated Airport
Systems (NPIAS) publication.

FAA Order 5010.4A, Airport Data and Information Management requires the FAA obtain the based aircraft data from the most reliable source possible (i.e. from the records of the airport manager, etc.). Collecting tail numbers and cross referencing them to the FAA Aircraft Registration database, through BasedAircraft.com provides this reliable source of data which also updates the FAA 5010 form.

Many airport development projects utilize the number and type of aircraft that are based at the airport or that use the airport on a regular basis (for example, apron expansions, hangar construction, other basic airfield facilities). Each airport development project must be justified by current use. The 5010 based aircraft data is one of many pieces of information that may justify a project. Based aircraft are also used in the FAA's NPIAS. Therefore, it is very important that the based aircraft information is accurate.

What is it that I need from you to make this happen?

If you have not received snail mail or email directly from us in the last 6 months then we probably don't have your plane in the based aircraft system. If this is the case please call (530) 888-8174 to make sure we get your aircraft entered into the based aircraft system.

The Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan Meeting.

The time has arrived! The Board of Supervisors meeting that will deal with The Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan is scheduled for November 14th. Please make sure your voice is heard on this matter. All our voices are important and should be heard, if you can't make it to the board meeting, please send your thoughts in to the Board via email, letters, or even a call. If you have any questions regarding the process, please contact me.

Legislative Update:

Governor Newsom has signed AB 480 (Ting), removing airports from surplus land use requirements for affordable housing. In addition, he signed SB 800 (Caballero), creating an Advanced Air Mobility, Zero-Emission, and Electrification Aviation Advisory Panel. Both bills are viewed as positive steps in securing and protecting the future of aviation.

FAA Grant Supports AVIATION ACADEMY

Last May, Jessup University launched a new Aviation Academy program after receiving a \$300K award through the FAA's Alicraft Pilots Workforce Development Grant Program. The grant is designed to attract and train students for future careers as pilots and aviation maintenance technicians to better alleviate the projected shortfall of pilots over the next decade.

The Academy provides flight simulation training and aviation-related classroom instruction to students ages 13-19. Partnering with Mach 5 Aviation and the Aerospace Museum of California, students learn to take-off and fly in a state-of-the-art flight simulator, then move on to fly in a real airplane. They also receive a full campus tour at Jessup.

"Having these students on campus provides them with a closer look at our degree program that is designed to fulfill the goals and desires of future aviators," said Loo Y. Ng, Lt Col, USAF (Ret.) and Jessup's Lead Faculty for Aviation and AFROTC. "Our program is unique because, it is FAA part 141 certified. This FAA certification

enables our graduates to take the Airline Transport Pilot's exams much sooner (1,000 instead of 1,500 flight hours) - this equates to significant savings for students pursuing careers with commercial airlines."


In addition, Jessup is one of few faith-based collegiate aviation programs in the area and aims to inspire and equip a new generation of pilots. Conducive for year-round flying, the Sacramento region offers prime air space for various learning environments. "Flying within military air space at Beale, coupled with the challenges of navigating the Sierra Nevada mountains as well as flying near an international airport give students great exposure to a variety of flight experience." No said.

Nearly 400 students are expected to process through the academy during the next year. "We are finding that, after completing the academy, about 80% of our students say they would consider flying as a profession," Ng added.

Jessup aviation students also participate in training students in the academy helping them complete maneuvers on the simulators as well as sharing information about flight theory, aviation fundamentals and career projections for the growing industry. "It's been cool to see these kids with so much talent that are confident and willing to put in the hard work early on so they can have a bright future," said aviation student, Brett Bickerstaff. "I've been blessed to have the opportunity to hopefully help them along their path and also direct them closer to God along the way. I look forward to flying with them in the future!"

Jessup's aviation program continues to grow and attract students. The department is currently working with the City of Lincoln and the Lincoln Airport Committee for site improvements to accommodate program expansion. Proposed improvements include the addition of an outdoor shaded seating area with concrete walkways. The additions will not only benefit students but public airport events such as the annual Lincoln Airport Open House where 5,000 people attended last year to experience hot air balloon rides, fly-bys, plane displays, food trucks and family fun for all.

This has made a tremendous difference in my life. Thank you again for everything.


