been a great summer! As we began to see the end of the

season, we had avoided extremely high temperatures and smokey conditions. At the end of August, <u>Rosemarie and I left for a 2-week trip to Canada and</u>

while we were enjoying a wonderful time up there, the roof fell in as the worst heat of the summer descended on Northern California. Our 2-day trip home was just beginning when a friend texted to let us know a fire had broken out in the canyon near Foresthill. Even though we were prepared, it was an eye-opener to come over the Sierras at



Squaw Valley. Through the smoke we watched an apocalyptic clouds developing over the fire, directly

ahead of us. Rosemarie suggested a left turn of 20 degrees, which proved to be an excellent choice. We kept a healthy distance from the TFR, and by the time we were nearing Placerville, we were completely out of the smoke and could see KAUN and the Foresthill Bridge.

Many had their lives disrupted by the Mosquito Fire. Quite a few spent the better part of 2 weeks evacuated. Our AAA President, Chase Morgan was certainly among those affected. The evidence: A call about a week after the fire broke out asking me if I'd please write the President's Message for this month's Propwash. He explained that he was working hard to move the site of his upcoming wedding from Foresthill to another venue near Nevada City. I certainly couldn't turn him down. As you can see from the photos, things worked out, and their wedding came off without any further hitches. Congratulations Chase and Natalie! Soon after his call, we got the best September rain this part of the world has seen in at least the last 20 years. As a result, a lot of people displaced by the fire were able to return to their homes, and the The progress of the fire was slowed substantially.



There has been considerable dialogue between Placer County and aircraft owners regarding tax assessments since the 2022 tax bills came out over the summer. Many aircraft have seen their assessed values increase. At the last 5AC meeting, Jaime Kirkpatrick from the Placer County Assessor's Office gave an excellent explanation of the process The county goes through in valuing aircraft for taxation purposes. It is important to note that small errors made when filling out the form can result in significant errors in the process, often not in the owners' favor. If you have any questions about that process, Jamie urged folks to contact the Placer County Assessor's Office to review your valuation form and verify that everything on it is correct. They can be reached by email at asrbusiness@placer.ca.gov or on the phone at 530-889-4300. Any money you save by doing so can be re-invested in Avgas.

This time of the year is nomination season for the board of AAA. It is the Past President's duty to fill out the roster of nominations to the AAA board for the coming year, and our Randy Leys been working hard for the past 2 months doing just that. Airport Manager Report by Jonathan Wright

Dear Auburn Airport Community,

As we enter October, the City's major projects are all coming to a head. In fact, both the East End Hangar project and the helicopter parking area project are starting simultaneously on October 3, 2022, which will create a lot of vehicle traffic over the next three months. We will do our best to minimize the impact on our stakeholders as these projects progress but there will be some. Please communicate any issues with Amber (acarrell@auburn.ca.gov)or I directly and we will work to get them resolved immediately. Again, I keep getting asked the question about runway closures and at this time we are not expecting any runway closures during this process, only temporary taxiway detours.

Speaking of construction, you will notice that I posted a NOTAM regarding a giant (250' tall) crane 1.5 miles southwest of Runway 25. This crane is part of Placer County's ongoing expansion of their buildings at the


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County's campus located off Bell Road. Expect it to be there for the next 6 months at least.

Leases are an ongoing topic of discussion at the airport, and most of you are tired of hearing me talk about them. However, it has come to my attention that some leases and subleases may have been sold without the benefit of City approval. I am not here to make anyone's transaction any harder, but all airport leases do require the approval of the City prior to transferring ownership. I can usually get the process of lease assignment done within 45 days so please keep this step-in mind when deciding to sell or sublet your hangar.

Welp, here we go again. The Federal Government has announced the second round of their terminal building grants and this time with more guidance. We are being told that it is best to break the project down into smaller pieces and apply for multiple rounds rather than trying to fund the entire terminal building replacement under one grant. This brings in a certain level of project uncertainty but if we can get through the design phase with the current federal funds than we will be ready for whatever funding is made available in the future. This is the strategy I will embrace on this next application.



We are finally hiring help for the airport. If you or someone you know is interested in entering the field of local government and working with all of the many projects we have going at the airport, we are hiring a Management Analyst to help me to be as effective in serving the airport as I can be. This would be a great opportunity for someone who can work independently, is project focused and likes to get stuff done.

Finally, as a reminder, the City's new airport fee schedule goes into effect October 1, 2022.

As always, it is my privilege to serve the Auburn aviation community.



RICHARD JEAN MICHEL CONTE WAS BORN IN PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI ON OCTOBER 7, 1953. HE IMMIGRATED TO THE UNITED STATES AS A YOUNG BOY AND ATTENDED ASCENSION SCHOOL IN NEW YORK FROM JUNE 1966-1968. IN 1972 RICHARD GRADUATED FROM NEW YORK AVIATION HIGH SCHOOL WHERE HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE HONOR SOCIETY AND THE JR. ROTC. RICHARD SERVED IN THE UNITED STATES AIR FORCE FROM 1972-1977 AND LATER SERVED TWELVE YEARS AS A POLICE OFFICER FOR THE CITY OF FOLSOM AND CITY OF OAKLAND (CA) POLICE DEPARTMENTS. RICHARD WORKED FOR TEN YEARS AS A PILOT FOR THE UNITED STATES CUSTOMS SERVICE BEFORE TAKING A POSITION AS A FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION FLIGHT SAFETY INSPECTOR. RICHARD WORKED AT THE FAA FLIGHT STANDARDS DISTRICT OFFICE IN SACRAMENTO FOR 33 YEARS WHERE HE WAS DIRECTLY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE ADMINISTRATION, INVESTIGATION, AND ENFORCEMENT OF SAFETY REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS FOR THE PRODUCTION, OPERATION, MAINTENANCE, AND MODIFICATION OF AIRCRAFT. RICHARD SPECIALIZED IN THE OPERATIONS AREA WHERE HE EVALUATED AIRMAN, TRAINING PROGRAMS, EQUIPMENT, AND FACILITIES. RICHARD RETIRED FROM THE FAA IN 2016.

IN RETIREMENT, RICHARD AND HIS WIFE TERRI WERE PARTNERS IN A SUCCESSFUL AIRCRAFT MANAGEMENT AND AVIATION CONSULTING BUSINESS, RICHARD LEVERAGED HIS DECADES OF EXPERIENCE IN THE AVIATION INDUSTRY TO PROVIDE OWNERS WITH A TURNKEY SOLUTION FOR RELIABLE AND DEPENDABLE AIRCRAFT MANAGEMENT.

RICHARD ALSO LOVED TO SHARE HIS AVIATION KNOWLEDGE, EXPERIENCE, AND PASSION WITH YOUNG ADULTS, NEW PILOTS, AND ASPIRING PROFESSIONAL AVIATORS. HE WAS AN ACTIVE FLIGHT INSTRUCTOR AND AN FAA DESIGNATED PILOT EXAMINER. DURING HIS LIFETIME, RICHARD LITERALLY INSPIRED, INSTRUCTED, CERTIFIED, AND TYPE RATED THOUSANDS OF PILOTS. RICHARD ALWAYS HAD A SPECIAL PLACE IN HIS HEART FOR PUBLIC SAFETY AVIATORS AND GENEROUSLY DONATED HIS TIME AND SERVICES TO LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES, FIRE DEPARTMENTS, AIR AMBULANCE COMPANIES, AND THE UNITED STATES COAST GUARD MAKING SURE THEY WERE PREPARED FOR THEIR CRITICAL MISSIONS. RICHARD VOLUNTEERED AS A RESERVE OFFICER FOR THE SACRAMENTO POLICE DEPARTMENT AND WAS SPECIFICALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR CONDUCING INITIAL AND RECURRENT TRAINING FOR POLICE OFFICER PILOTS.






appreciative she gave a bottle of birch syrup to our group as a thank you. We made pancakes the next day!

Local Scholarship/Grant Recipients Promote Aviation at The Reno Air Races

One of the featured events at the Reno Air Races is a display of vintage, classic and military airplanes of considerable quality hosted by the National Aviation Heritage Invitational (NAHI).



This remarkable collection of machines is judged for the authenticity and quality of the restoration. The Ellsworth Hovey Getchell Foundation extended invitations to

the 2022 flight scholarship and A&P grant recipients to attend the Races and promote the scholarship/grant programs offered by EHGF,AAA and EAA 526 at the NAHI event.

EHGF Board members Ken Dwelle (Hawker Sea Fury) and Ben Marsh (SNJ-4 Texan) had their restored aircraft on display for the NAHI competition. The scholarship recipients interacted with the crowd in this area and energized many youngsters to pursue aviation. This was an excellent mentoring opportunity

created by the Getchell Foundation.

The winner of this year's event was "Summer of 1942" the SNJ-4 restored, owned and flown by Ben Marsh. Ben's aircraft saw active service with the U. S. Navy from August 1942 to 1946 and was stationed at NAS Jacksonville, Corpus



Christi and Sanford as an advanced trainer. Graduating pilots would then transition into single engine fighter or attack aircraft, such the Wildcat or Hellcat, Dauntless or Avenger, etc. After the war, Ben's SNJ competed in the 1948 and '49 Cleveland Air Races, flown by Helen McBride.



Later, it was converted into a Zero replica, before being gutted and stored for 20 years.

Ben's restoration spanned eight and a half years (14,000 hours--not including volunteer hours) to return it to flight status. It features authentic installations of

gun and bomb systems as well as radio and oxygen systems. It features a period correct paint scheme circa NAS JAX 1943 and many other details. When asked about the SNJ-4 Texan Ben remarked; "it is a delight to fly and truly is the most




remarkable adventure of my life." Well Ben, that NAHI Trophy is pretty impressive too!

Kelly Richards' Play With Fire an original piece

At the conclusion of his season, Sunshine Flyers CFI; who flew smoke jumpers for a time based out of Fairbanks, Alaska, and subsequently Winthrop, Washington, through Bighorn Airways,

provides us with an update.

Beginning in March of this year, Kelly traveled to the Bighorn Airways training base in Wyoming to begin his preperation as a pilot for smoke jumping operations, then formally left in May to Washington. He was to tame the beast of a turboprop-powered, STOL cargo aircraft designated the "CASA C-212" that is specifically designed for dropping jumpers and freight. The majority of Kelly's missions involved performing reconnaissance in low-lying mountainous terrain before dropping smoke jumpers and their gear onto the fires to douse them. Both parties' skill *and* nerve are needed for this. He served as the first officer on his crew, which also included



a captain, five jumpers, and a jumpmaster.



Kelly considers his first season to be a success and anticipates returning for his second the following year. He is scheduled to return and resume his hazardous duties as an

audacious flight instructor in about a week. Wish him luck!













